

HYMNS WE SING

Being a church musician, I dearly love the hymns we sing. Over the next few months I'll be writing small vignettes about some of my most beloved hymns. I encourage you to "check out" our hymnals. In the articles I will give you the title, hymn number, and a reference scripture. I hope that you enjoy these little hymnody lessons.

"A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" is on page number 65 in the **CHALICE HYMNAL**. I like to use Psalm 46:1 as the reference scripture: God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. This hymn was written by Martin Luther, 1483-1536. Martin Luther was a Roman Catholic priest who was to become a great reformer, a person who brought about radical change within the church. Martin Luther's most notable gift to the world was "the priesthood of ALL believers." At this time in history most were Catholics, so they had to go to the priest instead of God for forgiveness. Through Martin's study of the scriptures, he read that we all are able to go, and speak directly to God for forgiveness and many things that touch our hearts.

Luther angered many when he nailed his "Ninety-five Thesis: to the door of the church. The leaders of the Roman Catholic church condemned him as a wicked and false teacher; thus leading to a trial and imprisonment. Through the work of God and friends, Luther escaped prison dressed as a knight. After his escape he stated, "I'll translate the Bible into language that all men can read therefore understanding the word of God for themselves." Through all of Martin's trials, he kept his faith in God realizing that God is a mighty fortress, and all whom are under God's care will be helped. Though all earth seems against us there is none on earth equal to God. *Greg*
