During my first Thanksgiving with Marsha and her family in Maysville, KY in 1979, I ate my first and last of oyster dressing. It similar to a lot of traditional



HEARTS TO HEROES

The mission of Hearts to Heroes is to provide care packages to our deployed military troops

stationed overseas. This is made possible by the donation of monies and items from those individuals and groups that support our military members. Hearts to Heroes became a Nonprofit 501©((3) Public Charity on April 23, 2010. Therefore, all donations are tax deductible. Hearts to Heroes ships care packages year round to all branches of the service. From Jan. 2007 through Sept. 23, 2011, 1,073 packages were shipped with the shipping costs totaling \$24,000.

Hearts to Heroes is also involved in a program called Guitars for the Troops. The donated guitars are received and repaired by several men from Quality Hand Built Guitars in Perry, GA. Once Hearts to Heroes has received the repaired guitars, they are then shipped to our deployed troops. If you should have a guitar you would like to donate, contact Eddie Icard at 478-922-9835.

Fridays have been set aside as Hearts to Heroes Days. Plan to wear a red shirt on Fridays to show that you support our troops overseas. A red Hearts to Heroes tee shirt can be purchased by contacting Myra Foskey at 478-230-0663 or by email at myra_foskey@yahoo.com. She can give you more specifics about the shirts and other Hearts to Heroes items you can purchase.

A list of needed items for the care packages is on the Hearts to Heroes table in the Narthex. If you need a list to carry with you, Sharon Kay has some extra ones with her on Sunday. There is a container in the fellowship hall where you may put your purchased items. Jerri Bosarge, who is our liaison with Hearts to Heroes, will then take the items to the pick up point in Warner Robins. 
