Remembering Rev. Del Von Almen

On Sept. 26, 2014, Rev. Del Von Almen retired from this life. According to the congregational history of First Christian, Warner Robins, Winona Smith wrote, "The first glimmer of First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Warner Robins began in Del Von Almen's dining room in Rome, Georgia in January 1957"

Del served churches in Kentucky, Tennessee, West Virginia, and Georgia. Del served in the Navy during WWII. He left active service at the end of the war and joined the Naval Reserve. Later he accepted the call to serve as a Chaplain during the Vietnam War. He retired as a Captain. He served in the Navy and Reserves for 30 years. He served as a minister for over 50 years.

He and his wife, Juanita, raised four children, Cherry, David, Sara, and John. He has well served the Christian Church, (Disciples of Christ) in all aspects of his ministry. By so doing his family increased as well. We remember and honor Rev. Von Almen by serving the church for as long as we are able.

I am certain he heard the words, "Well done, my good and faithful servant."

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The REAL Thanksgiving story

William Bradford & Myles Standish had much to be thankful for in 1621. Together with John Alden, Priscilla Mullins & the rest of the Pilgrims who founded Plymouth in Dec. 1620, they had survived their first brutal New England winter.

According to history reporter Peter F. Stevens, writing in *The Indianapolis Star*, only 55 of the more than 100 original settlers had lived to see the first thaw, but their summer labors had paid off with a bountiful harvest. The fields yielded such a surplus that Governor Bradford proclaimed a day of thanksgiving. He invited the Wampanoag Indians, who had helped with cultivation of the crops, to join the colonists' feast.

Four women & two teenaged girls cooked for the colonists & 90 Wampanoags. They began stoking the fires & arranging giant kettles as four men were sent to hunt foul. Gathering fresh game, oysters, clams & fish, they were soon ready to begin. With the arrival of Chief Massasoit, five deer were added to the menu.

The feast was not what we think of as Thanksgiving dinner. There were no potatoes, flour, bread, butter or pie. Corn cakes were the bread of the day.

Pumpkin was simply boiled, & there was no gravy of any kind. Some scholars say they made sauce from wild cranberries. But there was no sugar. Unless they found wild honey for sweetener, it would have been pretty tart.

Paintings at Pilgrim Hall Museum in Plymouth, Mass depict robust colonists in crisp black and white clothing. The truth is they probably wore the best of whatever was available & in a variety of colors.

Having survived starvation, illness, cold, & endless toil, they probably looked more haggard & careworn than robust.

But it was a true time of thanksgiving. They had survived. They had a bountiful harvest, & a future appeared to be possible. With God's help, it seemed even probable.

Think of these people on Thanksgiving Day. If your year has had problems, remember the colonists. They gave thanks though they survived far worse than any of us.

Thanksgiving Day is time to give thanks for what we have & for the work of those who have gone before us, work that helped to create the prosperity we have today.
